### Weather

Conditions should be dry for the next few days. The next possible storm system would be Tuesday afternoon across northern Wisconsin and a chance for showers in southern Wisconsin in the evening.

### River Levels

Flood warnings remain in effect for the Baraboo and Pecatonica Rivers. Both rivers are expected to fall below flood stage over the weekend.

### FEMA

Teams with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the U.S. Small Business Administration will be in Wisconsin next week to conduct a preliminary damage assessment in Kenosha, Racine and Walworth Counties. The teams will look at damage to both individuals (Individual Assistance) and to public infrastructure (Public Assistance). The damage assessment process will take about a week.

The Wisconsin National Guard has been assisting with debris removal in the Town of Portland in Monroe County. The 20 soldiers are expected to finish their mission on Saturday.

### **American Red Cross**

The American Red Cross has issued a consolidated report for response and recovery efforts since July 11. This includes assistance in the southeast, southwest and west central areas that have been impacted by storms and flooding. Here are some of the services provided:

Emergency Shelters - 10  
Overnight shelter stays – 50 people  
Client Cases opened - 250  
Clients served in cases - 607  
Hotline calls - 111  
Health Services contacts - 39  
Mental Health Contacts - 237  
Meals served - 1243  
Snacks served - 3210  
Bulk distribution sites - 6  
Clean up kits distributed - 2309  
Bulk items distributed (bleach, bug spray, water, gloves, masks, spray cleaner, etc.) - 7169  
Multiagency Agency Resource Centers (MARC) were open in Racine (Burlington High School, Burlington), Kenosha (Riverview Elementary School, Silver Lake), and Walworth (Health and Human Services Building, Elkhorn)  
Total Red Cross staff and volunteers - 315

**The State Emergency Operations Center is transitioning to Level 5.** State officials working closely with impacted counties believe we are in the recovery phase. There are only two rivers in a flood warning and both the Pecatonica and Baraboo Rivers will fall below flood stage this weekend. All local emergency operations centers are now closed. The Wisconsin Emergency Management Duty Officer and Senior Duty Officer will remain on call to respond to any additional resource requests or if weather conditions should change.
